News from the Key Stages

EYFS

Early Years Foundation Stage is a wonderful time when children can develop learning dispositions that are so important to their future learning. When they are engaged in their own chosen play and when they try to achieve their goals, they show highest levels of involvement, and thus commitment. Children are committed to achieve their goals and often they work with deepest interest and focus. Sometimes it requires adult support and involvement to make the task achievable so children can experience success. Children in early years are incredibly committed, whether it is trying to build a perfect sand castle, paint a flower, or build a garage with friends! Keep it up, committed little people!

KS1

Making a commitment involves dedicating yourself to something, like a person or an activity. Commitment within children is important to their learning as it enables them to persevere. By being committed to learning, children will naturally want and seek out ways in which to better themselves and improve. We develop commitment in KS1 by handing over the responsibility of learning through continuous provision where the children are encouraged to learn independently.

KS2

Commitment. The Oxford English dictionary defines commitment as the willingness to work hard and give your energy and time to a job or an activity. We can take a few important ideas from this. Firstly, willingness. This implies that the child wants to do the work, wants to commit and wants to succeed before they are made aware of the learning. We can achieve this by creating a fun and exciting working environment both at home and at school and introducing learning in a way which catches their attention: a 'hook' so to speak. Secondly, energy. This is the same as the amount of effort which is put in. This again comes from a comfortable working environment, confidence and understanding. Lastly, time. Time is extremely important. Giving children the time to commit will again further their confidence in learning. A confident learner is a committed learner. What can we take from this? In order to commit, first, we have to build a solid foundation of learning which incorporates all the other Cs. Commitment comes from the willingness of the child, we as teachers and you as parents can help prepare them for this by creating a fun, safe, consistent and achievable working environment.
