The New School at Dilmunia- Sitting down with Miss Shanee and Mr Paul.



We are on the verge of an exciting new phase for Nadeen School- moving to Dilmunia! We are moving into a brand new building with all facilities for students to use on site. We are really looking forward to the move and cannot wait for all of the opportunities this move will present to us- the biggest being a new Secondary School!

There have been many tours and presentations held for the community to attend to find out more. In order to get the very latest update on the new building, we spoke to Miss Shanee and Mr Paul directly to hear what their thoughts are of the move...

Q: What excites you the most about the new school?

Miss Shanee: I think I am most excited for all of the wonderful learning and experience opportunities our students will have, and our families and our team and our community will have. We will have a lot more facilities and things that we can do there that will just give us more opportunities to learn, and more opportunities to experience different things.

Mr Paul: New facilities and opportunities for everybody. So, when you go there, whatever you are interested in, there should be something there for you to enjoy. So, what excites me the most is the sports, the music, arts, the makerspaces, science labs, outdoor play- all those opportunities that we don't have here, that excites me the most. And swimming! I should always mention swimming.



Q: How long have you been planning the new campus?

Miss Shanee: I have been planning the new campus since 2017. That was 6 years ago!

Mr Paul: I've been planning it since I have been in touch with Nadeen School- so now for about a year and a half. So when I got the job to join, immediately we started talking about the new school and getting excited about moving from the current site to the new school and that involved planning the rooms, the IT, the curriculum, the staff, the use of the building, everything. So very very very exciting- for about a year and a half now.

Q: What are your hopes for the first school year at the new site?

Miss Shanee: That's a really good question... I hope for so many things. I hope that everybody embraces the journey- and what I mean by that is that: I hope that everybody enjoys the journey that we will take to get there, and then once we're there everybody enjoys the new experience and that they enjoy all of the new things that we can do and that people have fun being in a new place learning new things in new and different ways. I hope that everybody enjoys this next chapter of our story.

Mr Paul: I hope that everyone feels a part of the campus. I hope that everyone feels excited and that they all have a role to play and a part to play in making everyone feel welcome. I hope that everyone enjoys it and is happy and can take lots of opportunities and make the most of what's there on the campus. So that is what I hope; that everyone is happy, everyone is safe, and everyone really makes the most of the first year and the opportunities that we don't have here.

Q: Outside of the major changes in facilities, what experiences do you believe that the new campus will give Nadeen students that they have never previously had?

Miss Shanee: Ok, I think that where we are located in Dilmunia, we will be right in the centre of it, as in the geography of the land. Right in the middle. And, we have always been a community school, meaning that we like to do things for our community and like to be in service to others in our community. We like to do things like beach clean ups and go on school trips and we do that already, but what we have never been able to do very well is, be an active member of our community. So, what I mean is that because we are in the middle of Dilmunia, we will be able to walk to the beach, we will be able to walk over to the mall to do things there, we can walk and cycle, and swim and everything within our community. We can do service projects there. This will be our big neighbourhood without having to go somewhere as our community will be right there. It will be different because we will be very active in our own community and know the names of people right there.

Mr Paul: That's an excellent question. I think that outside of the facilities it will give us to give our students the opportunities to work with and be around older students. So rather than leaving at the end of Year 6, Year 7 will then have Year 8, then Year 9 and Year 10. So, students will benefit from being able to have projects and competitions, group work, adventures everything with students from all ages. So away from the facilities, I can't wait to see what do Nadeen students look like in Year 8, Year 9? How do they act in Year 10? What are they like in Year 11, 12 and 13? That really excites me how we can then take students in the older year groups.







Q: Are we planning to take the current cats to the new school?

Miss Shanee: So, when it comes to cats, we have a bit of a tricky situation and I'll tell you why. Cats are very territorial. That means they like where they live, they know where they live, they like the smell of where they live and that's where they want to live. So, what we're trying to figure out is how would they react if we pick them up from Um Al Hassam and put them into Dilmunia, where they don't know the smell, they don't know the place, they are not used to it, it might upset them a bit. So, we are trying to figure out what would be best for them. I'd love to take them with us, but it might not be the best thing for them, and they need to be comfortable and happy whatever we decide to do.





Q: What animals are being planned for the farm?

Miss Shanee: So, we are taking our chickens, we are taking our ducks, and Mr Paul will be very happy that we will also be taking Roger the rooster because he loves him so much. Oddly enough we received a request today about having rabbits, now we can't confirm this yet, but we could have other visiting animals because we will have more space to do it. Someone asked about having birds in a cage, but we would not like to have birds that can fly in a cage, so we won't be having that but definitely our chickens, rooster and ducks will be coming with the opportunity to have other visiting animals.

Mr Paul: I like the ducks; they are inquisitive and interesting. Every time I have a Coffee Morning with the parents, the rooster always makes noise. I saw a picture on the website that Nadeen once had a goat, I liked his floppy ears.



Q: Will there be a coach for the swimming pool lessons/if yes will there be an extra curricular club for swimming?

Mr Paul: Yes, there will be a coach and yes, there will be extra curricular activities. We really want to encourage everybody who is interested to get involved in water safety and swimming. I believe it's going to be a big part of not only the school, but the new community in Dilmunia. So, I think that for the whole community, I think that's going to be a wonderful thing for us to offer as Nadeen School.

Q: How long will it take for Nadeen to go up to Year 13?

Mr Paul: I think it'll happen quickly. Normally, it would be one year group at a time, but we've already seen [four] weeks ago we confirmed Year 9 for the summer, so I think in the next three to four years we will be having students start Year 13. I think in four years.

A very big thank you to Mr Paul and Ms Shanee for giving us their time and such detailed information about our new school. We are just so excited!

Languages and English Themes



Block 3 was a celebration of all things Languages and the Languages team did a brilliant job.

We had weekly songs in different languages, translations on the boards outside and celebrated in lessons.

We also took some time to interview Miss Amita who was one of the members of staff who helped to celebrate languages at Nadeen. Please see her responses below.

Q: What languages do you know, and which ones can you speak fluently?

Miss Amita: Ok, so, I know four languages, which I can speak fluently- or I would say three very fluently and the fourth one is intermediate. So, the first language I can speak fluently is English of course. The second language I speak fluently is Hindi, that's an Indian language. I speak Sindhi which is also an Indian language and then there is a fourth language which I speak at an intermediate level which is French.

Q: How do you know the language and what does it mean to you?

Miss Amita: I know Sindhi and Hindi because these are my mother tongue, so I've been listening to this ever since I was born. It was spoken in my family and wherever I was brought up. I learnt English from the very beginning as I went to an English school. While I was at school, I also learnt French as a second language and then it went on by doing my further education. I worked in a French company and when there I was sent on training to France and that's where I continued speaking French and I picked up the language very well.

Q: How do you say 'good morning' in your language? We usually say "Namaste" which is a greeting as hello. We usually greet each other like this in the morning.

Q: What was the most successful part of the Languages theme?

Miss Amita: I think what was very exciting was having students in the whole school get so involved in all of the activities we were running, such as writing on the white boards outside. Students were very happy to get involved to translate the word on those boards in their own languages. They were very happy to share their languages on those white boards. Secondly, I think the whole school really enjoyed learning songs in the different languages. I also had a lot of students come up to me who were very encouraged to go ahead and learn a new language thanks to this languages theme block that we had. So that was very exciting and that was very fulfilling.

Block 4 was the English languages theme and this team also worked very hard with many activities to celebrate all things English such as hosting the Book Fair, words of the day and week, reading and writing activities.




